These beautiful places NEED stewards. Volunteers are their life blood.





To start, we are offering, with Lee Greener Gateway Committee & others, some events to help folks know what to look for and then how to handle a 'situation'. These will be educational events, field work and displays in town. Included will be composting, removing invasive plants, walks, using native plants and encouraging pollinators.

Non-native or invasive plants (there are other species besides plants) are a major concern everywhere.

Invasive plants or animals disrupt the natural cycles of our native flora & fauna which have evolved together.

We hope you will take this challenge to explore your home turf & become aware of what you really have in your yard.


And there are benefits to you: fresh air, exercise, a sense of doing the right thing and helping our town! We hope to see you out there!

R.I.P. REMOVE INVASIVE PLANTS


